THE EXCEPTION, by Christian Jungersen.
Translated by Anna Paterson. (Nan A. Talese/Doubleday, \$26.) Jungersen's second novel, a paranoid tale involving characters in an office that researches genocide, is a complex study of what constitutes evil.

CHARGING THE NET: A History of Blacks in Tennis From Althea Gibson and Arthur Ashe to the Williams Sisters, by Cecil Harris and Larryette Kyle-DeBose. (Ivan R. Dee, \$26.95.) In-depth stories about coaches, umpires and stars. **SHADOW OF THE SILK ROAD,** by Colin Thubron. (HarperCollins, \$25.95.) The British travel writer's poetic account of his 7,000-mile journey from Xian, China, to Antioch, Turkey.

SILENCE FELL, by Josephine Dickinson. (Houghton Mifflin, \$22.) The British poet, deaf since childhood, writes about her six-year marriage to a sheep farmer twice her age.

THE UNKNOWN TERRORIST, by Richard Flanagan. (Grove, \$24.) A stripper goes to bed and wakes up as the most hunted woman in Australia.

VELLUM, by Matt Donovan. (Houghton Mifflin, paper, \$11.95.) Donovan's richly textured first book of poems confronts the power of art as well as its potential uselessness.

AN ILLUMINATED LIFE: Belle da Costa Greene's Journey From Prejudice to Privilege, by Heidi Ardizzone. (Norton, \$35.) A biography of the glamorous first director of the Morgan Library, who concealed her race in order to pursue her dream.

WEST FROM APPOMATTOX: The Reconstruction of America After the Civil War, by Heather Cox Richardson. (Yale University, \$30.) A history professor argues that great-frontier idealism redefined the nation in the late 19th century.

NOT REMOTELY CONTROLLED: *Notes on Television, by Lee Siegel. (Basic, paper, \$15.95.)* A collection of essays from the cultural provocateur.

Paperback Row

JAMES TIPTREE, JR.: The Double Life of Alice B. Sheldon, by Julie Phillips. (Picador, \$18.) By the early 1970s, James Tiptree Jr. was one of the brightest-burning talents in science fiction, conjuring interplanetary gender-bending fantasies that revolutionized the genre. But in 1976, Tiptree was revealed to be Alice Sheldon, an enigmatic woman who had also been, in her colorful career, a psychologist, a C.I.A. counterintelligence analyst and a chicken farmer. This fascinating portrait by Phillips (inset) traces the life and work of a woman who found in her invented persona a partial resolution to the conflicts that plagued her throughout her life. (Sheldon committed suicide in 1987.) In the Book Review, Dave Itzkoff called this biography "engrossing and endlessly revelatory."

THIRTEEN MOONS, by Charles Frazier. (Random House, \$14.95.) Frazier's first novel, "Cold Mountain," distilled the Civil War into the alternating stories of a lone Confederate deserter, making his way home through the mountains of western North Carolina, and the young woman awaiting his return. This ambitious follow-up revisits the same region, as Frazier's aged narrator, Will Cooper — a former frontier trader and emissary to Andrew Jackson's cabinet — recalls another epic 19th-century journey: the forced expulsion of some 17,000 Native Americans, who set off on what came to be known as the Trail of Tears

THE PUNISHMENT OF VIRTUE: Inside Afghanistan After the Taliban, by Sarah Chayes. (Penguin, \$16.) Shortly after the fall of the Taliban, Chayes, who was in Kandahar as a correspondent for National Public Radio, left her job to help run an aid organization called Afghans for Civil Society. This sharply observed memoir indicts

American policy in post-Taliban Afghanistan, which Chayes argues has allowed corrupt tribal warlords to reoccupy positions of power and the Taliban to re-establish themselves.

THE KEEP, by Jennifer Egan. (Anchor, \$13.95.) This dazzling neo-Gothic novel mixes sordid realism and John Fowles-like magic. On the lam from a brush with the mob in New York, Danny, Egan's protagonist, makes his way to an Eastern European castle, which his cousin Howie is turning into a hotel. Chapters alternate between Danny — stranded in a castle full of passageways — and Ray, a convict who's writing the story of Danny, Howie, the castle and so on, in a creative-writing workshop. Our reviewer, Madison Smartt Bell, called "The Keep" a "work both prodigiously entertaining and profoundly moving" that "lays out a whole Escherian architecture, replete with metafictional trapdoors, pitfalls, infinitely receding reflections and trompe l'oeil effects."

WINDSWEPT: The Story of Wind and Weather, by Marq de Villiers. (Walker, \$14.95.) Hurricane Ivan — a brutal storm in 2004 that lasted nearly three weeks, killed scores of people and spawned some 111 tornadoes in five states — provides a framework for this lively investigation. Christopher C. Burt's EXTREME WEATHER: A Guide & Record Book — Climate Change Edition (Norton, \$25.95) is a compendium of the hottest, coldest, wettest, driest, windiest, snowiest weather on the planet and provides concise explanations for many of nature's angry moods.

BABYLON: And Other Stories, by Alix Ohlin. (Vintage Contemporaries, \$13.95.) Just as Ohlin's first novel, "The Missing Person," combined unlikely elements like domestic longing, academia and

eco-terrorism into an impressive page turner, these versatile stories defy literary categories, blending realism and modern fabulism.

CONSIDER THE LOBSTER: And Other Essays,

by David Foster Wallace. (Back Bay/Little, Brown, \$14.99.) Wallace, the author of such defiantly experimental fictions as "Infinite Jest" and "Oblivion," showcases his morally observant side in these funny, incisive magazine articles. In "Up, Simba," a week on the road with Senator John McCain during his 2000 run for the presidential nomination becomes an inquiry into leadership and the cynicism of young voters. And a review of a John Updike novel becomes an exploration of how the "brave new individualism and sexual freedom" of the 1960s devolved into "the joyless and anomic self-indulgence of the Me Generation."

THE PALE BLUE EYE, by Louis Bayard. (Harper Perennial, \$14.95.) This clever historical thriller, set in the Hudson Valley, features a moody West Point cadet named Edgar Allan Poe, enlisted to help a retired New York City police constable find the fiend who is killing cadets and carving the hearts from their bodies.

THE NAKED TOURIST: In Search of Adventure and Beauty in the Age of the Airport Mall, by Lawrence Osborne. (North Point, \$14.) Osborne, a dyspeptic professional traveler in search of a place "outside" the modern world and modern tourism, sets out along the "Asian Highway," working his way east from Dubai through Calcutta and Thailand, then into the uncharted forests of New Guinea.
