**MOTHERLAND:** A Philosophical History of Russia, by Lesley Chamberlain. (Rookery/Overlook, \$35.) Chamberlain focuses on how Western ideas were absorbed into Russian thinking.

# Paperback Row

THE LAY OF THE LAND, by Richard Ford. (Vintage Contemporaries, \$14.95.) The third installment, following "The Sportswriter" (1986) and "Independence Day" (1995), in the serial epic of Frank Bascombe - flawed husband, fuddled dad, writer turned real estate agent - was selected by the Book Review as one of last year's 10 best books. It's Thanksgiving 2000: the Florida recount grinds on, and Bascombe, now 55, battles prostate cancer, copes with a strange turn in his second marriage and logs long hours on the highways and back roads of New Jersey, taking expansive stock of middle-age defeats. "By now, we have gotten to know Frank Bascombe well enough to take his measure, and to appreciate that, like almost no one else in our recent literature, he's life-size," A.O. Scott wrote here.

**LET ME FINISH,** by Roger Angell. (Harvest/Harcourt, \$15.) Now in his 80s, Angell, the longtime sportswriter and editor for The New Yorker, has enjoyed what he calls "a life sheltered by privilege and engrossing work, and shot through with good luck." These charming autobiographical essays recall the pleasures and pains of Angell's childhood (his mother, Katharine White, was The New Yorker's fiction editor, and his stepfather, E. B. White, was one of its legendary writers), and his colorful colleagues during a distinguished career.

**WINTER'S BONE,** by Daniel Woodrell. (Back Bay/Little, Brown, \$13.99.) The Ozarks are rendered in a ramshackle, beautiful realism in this haunting novel, as Ree Dolly, Woodrell's hardboiled 16-year-old heroine, has a week to find her fugitive father before the county repossesses the family home.

**TEMPTATIONS OF THE WEST: How to Be** 

Modern in India, Pakistan, Tibet, and Beyond, by Pankaj Mishra. (Picador, \$15.) Part travelogue, part journalism, this is an acute survey of the complex, often violent struggle for ancient societies to define themselves in the face of clashing religions, poverty, corruption and intrusions (cultural, political, religious) from the West. Mishra, who lives in both India and England, offers powerful vignettes, from bloody confrontations in Kashmir between Hindus and Muslims to a Bollywood starlet stripping off her clothes over the objections of her horrified father. THE **RULING CASTE:** Imperial Lives in the Victorian Raj, by David Gilmour. (Farrar, Straus & Giroux, \$17.) British India, with its population of nearly 300 million people, was administered throughout Queen Victoria's reign by a mere thousand or so British officials of the Indian Civil Service. Gilmour's sympathetic portrait describes how they were recruited and trained for careers marked by prolonged separations from wives and children, illnesses and in many cases premature death.

**LEARNING TO KILL: Stories,** by Ed McBain. (Otto Penzler/Harvest/Harcourt, \$14.) Grouped thematically under headings like "Women in Jeopardy" and "Private Eyes," this collection, written between 1952 and 1957 under various pseudonyms, shows the first steps McBain (1926-2005) took toward becoming a prolific crime writer.

#### NO TWO ALIKE: Human Nature and Human

**Individuality,** by Judith Rich Harris. (Norton, \$16.95.) In this "scientific detective story," Harris, whose previous book, "The Nurture Assumption," attacked the notion that parenting styles shape children, investigates why people — even identical twins who grow up in the same home with the same genes — end up with different personalities. **MAGIC TIME,** by Doug Marlette. (Picador, \$15.) Marlette's second novel revisits the Freedom Summer of 1964, when volunteers poured into Mississippi to register black voters in the face of bitter white opposition. (Marlette, a Pulitzer Prize-winning editorial cartoonist, died last month in a car accident in Mississippi.) When terrorists bomb a museum in Manhattan, Carter Ransom, a Mississippi-born journalist transplanted to New York, returns home, plagued by memories of the 1964 summer when he fell in love with a civil rights worker killed in a church bombing.

**STUART: A Life Backwards,** *by Alexander Masters.* (*Delta, \$12.*) Soon after Masters got to know Stuart Shorter, a "polydrug-addicted, alcoholic, 'Jekyll and Hyde' personality with delusional paranoia," he decided to write a book about him. This tragicomic portrait, told in reverse chronology, is a remarkable account of a free fall into the state that British social workers label "chaotic" homelessness. Masters backpedals through his subject's incarcerated 20s to the horrors of his childhood, highlighting a pattern of betrayal and abuse. (In 2002, Stuart, then 33, was killed when he fell — or walked — in front of a speeding train.)

#### THE SHORT LIFE AND LONG TIMES OF MRS.

**BEETON**, by Kathryn Hughes. (Anchor, \$15.95.) "Beeton's Book of Household Management," a collection of recipes and domestic advice, was published in 1861 and made "Mrs. Beeton" synonymous with Victorian domesticity. This startling biography of Isabella Beeton, who died at 28 in 1865, reveals a more unconventional figure.

IHSAN TAYLOR
