Editor's Choice

THE MASTER BEDROOM, by Tessa Hadley. (Holt, \$26.) In Hadley's novel — a chess game of slow-burn erotic maneuvers — a London professor returning to her childhood home in Wales is attracted to the teenage son of an old friend.

SUNSTROKE: And Other Stories, by Tessa Hadley. (Picador, paper, \$13.) These deft and resonant tales encapsulate moments of hope and humiliation in a kind of shorthand of different lives lived.

TOM BEDLAM, by George Hagen. (Random House, \$25.95.) Hagen's intricate, brazenly eventful family saga gallops from a Dickensian Britain to South Africa to the battlefields of World War I.

THE SEPTEMBERS OF SHIRAZ, by Dalia Sofer. (Ecco/HarperCollins, \$24.95.) In this powerful first novel, the father of a prosperous Jewish family in Tehran is arrested shortly after the Iranian revolution.

DOWN THE NILE, *Alone in a Fisherman's Skiff*, by Rosemary Mahoney. (Little, Brown, \$23.99.) Mahoney juxtaposes the account of her solo rowing journey with entries from the diaries of Flaubert and Florence Nightingale, who were both on the Nile in 1849.

INNER WORKINGS: Literary Essays 2000-2005, by J. M. Coetzee. (Viking, \$25.95.) From the 2003 Nobel Prize winner, an erudite and charming master class on the work of 20 great writers of the 20th century.

FALLING BEHIND: How Rising Inequality Harms the Middle Class, by Robert H. Frank. (University of California; cloth, \$50; paper, \$19.95.) A professor examines the adverse effects of the rise of the ultra-rich.

TO MY DEAREST FRIENDS, by Patricia Volk. (Knopf, \$23.) Two Manhattan women are brought together by an unusual bequest.

DEVILS IN THE SUGAR SHOP, by Timothy Schaffert. (Unbridled, paper, \$14.95.) Wise and worldly Omaha women thrive in their own ersatz Manhattan.

Paperback Row

THE WORLD IS FLAT: A Brief History of the Twenty-First Century — Further Updated and Expanded, by Thomas L. Friedman. (Picador, \$16.)

Building on his 1999 book, "The Lexus and the Olive Tree," Friedman, a Pulitzer Prize-winning columnist for The New York Times, maps the next phase of globalization. What leveled the world's economic playing field? Friedman cites 10 forces, including the dot-com bubble and bust, which turned China and India into high-tech epicenters of the outsourcing world. "The World Is Flat" considers the great opportunities and threats globalization represents to older industrialized nations, especially the United States. In the Book Review, Fareed Zakaria called Friedman's metaphor of a flat world "ingenious": "Its fundamental insight is true and deeply important."

THE DEVIL'S FEATHER, by Minette Walters. (Vintage Crime/Black Lizard, \$13.95.) After she's kidnapped in Baghdad and held for three days by a sadistic mercenary, Connie Burns, a British foreign correspondent and the heroine of Walters's layered thriller, flies home and retreats to a rotting old house in the Dorset countryside. Connie delves into the house's troubled history, terrified that her tormentor hasn't finished with her.

THE HORIZONTAL WORLD: Growing Up Wild in the Middle of Nowhere, by Debra Marquart. (Counterpoint, \$15.) Born into an agricultural family in North Dakota, Marquart escaped the farm for a peripatetic career as a rock musician, poet and English

teacher. In this elegiac memoir, Marquart reflects on the price of abandoning her roots.

GRIEF, by Andrew Holleran. (Hyperion, \$12.) In Holleran's slender, elegant fourth novel, a middle-aged gay man mourns his mother, his empty life and his generation of gay men. Arriving in Washington from a small town in the South, the unnamed narrator finds a book of Mary Todd Lincoln's letters and discovers a kindred spirit in a woman who never recovered from her husband's death.

THE UNITED STATES OF ARUGULA: The Sun-Dried, Cold-Pressed, Dark-Roasted, Extra Virgin Story of the American Food Revolution, by David Kamp. (Broadway, \$14.95.) This smart, lively book tells how food in postwar America "hopped the fence from the ghettos of home economics and snobby gourmandism to the expansive realm of popular culture." Kamp, a writer and editor at Vanity Fair and GQ, begins with the three early tastemakers — James Beard, Julia Child and Craig Claiborne — and traces a detailed path to Alice Waters and Chez Panisse, the fine-dining franchises created by Mario Batali and Daniel Boulud, and the opening of Dean & DeLuca in SoHo.

THE PROMISE OF HAPPINESS, by Justin Cartwright. (Bloomsbury, \$14.95.) A bitingly funny portrait of a contemporary English family in turmoil, Cartwright's novel is set in motion when the family's linchpin — the eldest daughter, Juliet — is released after two years in an American prison for fencing a Tiffany window.

THE GIRLS WHO WENT AWAY: The Hidden History of Women Who Surrendered Children for Adoption in the Decades Before Roe v. Wade, by Ann Fessler. (Penguin, \$15.) Between the end of World War II and the legalization of abortion nationwide in 1973, 1.5 million babies were given up for adoption in the United States. Fessler's analysis of the social context of adoption includes disturbing oral histories. (She begins and ends the book with the story of her own search for her birth mother.)

LISEY'S STORY, by Stephen King. (Pocket, \$9.99.) Scott Landon, the fragile prize-winning novelist at the core of this haunting love story, is a conduit to the supernatural world. After Scott's death, his widow, Lisey, takes up arms against a murderous stalker in this world and a blood-hungry beast in Boo'ya Moon, a parallel world that sheltered Scott during a horrific childhood and inspired him throughout his creative life. Boo'ya Moon is "as real as J.M. Barrie's Never-Never Land," Jim Windolf wrote here.

SPALDING'S WORLD TOUR: The Epic Adventure That Took Baseball Around the Globe — and Made It America's Game, by Mark Lamster. (PublicAffairs, \$14.95.) Lamster rollickingly recreates the six-month exhibition baseball tour that Albert Goodwill Spalding led around the globe in 1888-89.
