## Paperback Row

THE EMPEROR'S CHILDREN, by Claire Messud. (Vintage, \$14.95.) This masterly comedy of manners captures New York's chattering class in the months before and immediately following Sept. 11. Messud intertwines the stories of three friends - Danielle Minkoff, Marina Thwaite and Julius Clarke - who are entitled but floundering Brown graduates on the cusp of their 30s and "torn between Big Ideas and a party." The despot of the title is Marina's father, Murray Thwaite, a legendary journalist and cultural critic whose family is upended by two ambitious interlopers: Ludovic Seeley, an Australian magazine editor; and Murray's nephew Frederick Tubb, a college dropout who vearns to become Murray's disciple. The Book Review named "The Emperor's Children" one of the top 10 books of 2006. "Claire Messud is a novelist of unnerving talent," Meghan O'Rourke wrote here.

POLITICS LOST: From RFK to W - How **Politicians Have Become Less Courageous** and More Interested in Keeping Power Than in Doing What's Right for America, by Joe Klein. (Broadway, \$12.95.) Klein — "fed up with the insulting welter of sterilized speechifying, insipid photo ops and idiotic advertising that passes for public discourse these days" - takes a skeptical look at pollsters, consultants and candidates of the last 40 years. TALKING RIGHT: How Conservatives Turned Liberalism Into a Tax-Raising, Latte-Drinking, Sushi-Eating, Volvo-Driving, New York Times-Reading, Body-Piercing, Hollywood-Loving, Left-Wing Freak Show, by Geoffrey Nunberg. (Public Affairs, \$15.95.) In a succession of lively chapters, Nunberg, a linguist at the University of California, Berkeley, explains how Republicans have taken control of political dialogue, turning "liberal" into an accusation.

**THE CAPRICES,** by Sabina Murray. (Grove, \$13.) Winner of the 2003 PEN/Faulkner award for fiction, Murray's fiercely intense short-story collection roams the Pacific theater of World War II, from the Philippines to Singapore to New Guinea, plucking tales of resistance — or endurance or despair — from the terrors of combat.

A WRITER'S LIFE, by Gay Talese. (Random House, \$15.95.) "Writing," Talese notes in this elegant, discursive memoir, "is often like driving a truck at night without headlights, losing your way along the road, and spending a decade in the ditch." "A Writer's Life" includes chunks of autobiography, describing the author's childhood in New Jersey; his stint as a reporter at The New York Times (which inspired "The Kingdom and the Power," his best-selling 1969 history of the paper); and his reporting on the civil rights struggle in Selma in the 1960s. But much of the book is about false starts and dead ends; Talese reflects on long periods of struggle, abandoned stories and books.

**ABUNDANCE:** A Novel of Marie Antoinette, by Sena Jeter Naslund. (Harper Perennial, \$15.95.) In this extravagant fictional memoir, Naslund, the author of "Ahab's Wife," imagines the life of the doomed queen, from her "birth as a citizen of France" at 14 and her marriage to the future King Louis XVI to her execution in 1793, amid the fiery chaos of the French Revolution.

**FEVER:** The Life and Music of Miss Peggy Lee, by Peter Richmond. (Picador, \$15.) An adoring account of the pop-jazz singing siren (1920-2002), "Fever" delves into Lee's music and highly stylized persona, and presents her turbulent personal life as a struggle between her perfectionism and the uncer-

tainty carried over from her miserable childhood.

ATLAS: From the Streets to the Ring — A Son's Struggle to Become a Man, by Teddy Atlas and Peter Alson. (Ecco/Harper, \$13.95.) The boxing guru and TV analyst traces his circuitous route from Staten Island street thug to trainer of heavyweight champions, and ruminates on fighting as a form of masculine psychotherapy.

**TALK TALK,** by T. Coraghessan Boyle. (Penguin, \$14.) This propulsive thriller is built around a frightening case of identity theft. When a routine traffic stop lands her in jail for a series of crimes she never committed, Dana Halter, a strong-willed deaf woman, discovers that someone has been living a life of criminal excess at her expense. With little help from the police, Dana and her devoted boyfriend set out to find the identity thief, who initiates a cross-country game of cat and mouse. "Boyle takes readers on a wild ride," Will Blythe wrote in the Book Review.

KREMLIN RISING: Vladimir Putin's Russia and the End of Revolution, Updated Edition, by Peter Baker and Susan Glasser. (Potomac Books, \$18.95.) Baker and Glasser, a husband-and-wife team who for nearly four years between 2001 and 2004 served as Moscow bureau chiefs for The Washington Post, present a wide-ranging look at "Project Putin" — the years in which Vladimir Putin, a former lieutenant colonel in the K.G.B., rose to become a would-be post-Soviet czar.
